The New Build



There has been a huge amount of work on progressing this by Board members. The Lottery funding is now through, never an easy process, and the architect's plans have been approved by NAC's planning department. The build can now go out to tender, and this is the stage we are at just now. The plans look great; the building will be

such an asset for both 3TG and the local community. As a rough guide, here are some details:

Building axis faces north/south, with the frontage facing north into the allotments

A split roof, with solar panels to the south and a sedum 'green roof' to the

north; Underfloor heating and roof; water harvesting; Composting toilet; timber pergola over entrance; decking area; Boot cleaning store; Foyer; Office; 3 X storeroom; Kitchen; Multi-Purpose room; Exterior finished in larch cladding

The new build will bring both electricity and water on site, which will be tremendous for everyone

Development Worker

Funding has been secured to employ a Development Worker for the 3TG. The remit of this post is: to develop opportunities for local people in the Three Towns in key areas such as knowledge, skills employment

opportunities, and promoting positive physical and mental health. This will involve working with individuals and groups.

Funding for the post is over 3 years, but if successful then additional funding will be sought.

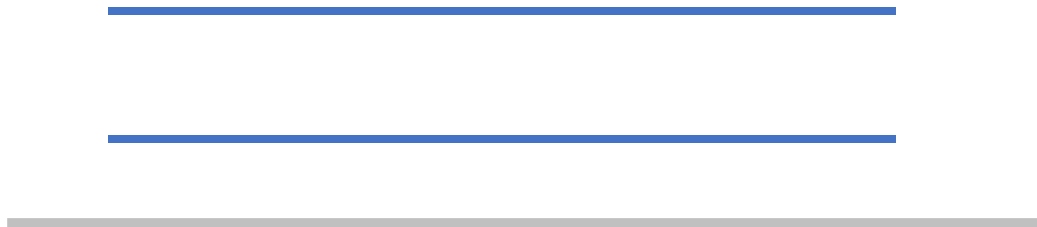
Plot Fees

Site Security

There have been ongoing issues with this, and it is clearly of concern. The Board has been in touch with Police Scotland, who are making regular visits to the site. We have also had a very generous offer of support from NAC to have community workers liaise with young people at the site in the evenings, in order to build dialogue and understanding. This community approach

really is the only way forward, as the site can never be fully secured. It has been an issue ever since the site opened, but damage has always been very limited and we are trying to avoid anything that would jeopardize a finely balanced situation. Your support is essential in this approach. Plot holders are encouraged not to leave valuable

equipment and other items on their plots.

During the winter months there are very few plot holders on site, therefore you may leave at 1pm and possibly be the last one on site that day. It would therefore be helpful for everyone to carry their key and to lock the gate behind them if they think there is no-one else on site.



Communications and Social Media

The new Board is resetting its communications strategy in order to make sure that plot holders are regularly updated on key issues, and have access to the Board. This newsletter is part of that effort. Our non-public Facebook group has lost administrators over the months, and we have reset this with a new 'Three Towns Growers' group that now has 4 Board administrators. This

is the only Three Towns Growers group that is supported and directly administrated by the Board. It is there for plot holders and others to chat about their plots, share ideas and so on. It should however be noted that it is not a forum for asking questions of the Board; this should be done by using the contacts in this newsletter. Any comments or questions directed at the Board will therefore

not receive a formal answer via that Facebook group.

It is essential that plot holders are aware that as members of 3TG they are subject to the Code of Conduct of 3TG, regardless of the forum they are using. Any post which brings the 3TG and, as our landlords, North Ayrshire Council, into disrepute will be subject to that Code of Conduct, a copy of which has already been emailed out to all plot holders.

Hints and Tips

January 2021 edition

Crimson Clover



This is great as a winter cover crop. Plant in the autumn, around September if your beds are empty.

It is leguminous, fixing nitrogen from the air. It can be dug into the soil as a natural fertilizer, a 'green manure', although it has a beautiful flower that bees love, so one bed a year could be left with crimson clover, allowing the soil to recover and benefiting insects.

We need suggestions for our next edition. If there are any issues that you would like addressed, or any ideas that you feel could help others, then please let us know.

Have you made something that has meant recycling materials instead of buying new?

Mustard Seed



This performs exactly the same function as crimson clover. It is useful in beds that have previously had potatoes, as it deters wireworm.
